A Focus on Giving Back

Fundraisers, Volunteering and Collections at Frontier High School

Helping those in need is the cornerstone of what brings together the Frontier Community. Since the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year, students at Frontier High School have been devising ways that they can give back to the community.

In October, the varsity and JV volleyball teams volunteered at The Teacher's Desk, a local organization that provides supplies to teachers. Under the direction of Coach Nicholas Penberthy, the JV team assembled 500 binders with school supplies and the varsity team assembled over 2,500 glue packs! Their volunteer efforts will impact over 3,000 students in the City of Buffalo and greater Western New York area.

In addition to learning about global cultures, the International Club also held a collection to help Afghanistan evacuees. They received donations of household items and toiletries as well as fundraised for needed supplies. Club members were humbled by the support and happy to help families in need through the International Institute of Buffalo.

Kicking off the giving season, Frontier High School began organizing its annual Thanksgiving Food Drive in late October to be bigger than ever. This year, the drive set out to help 100 families from across the district. In addition, they needed to meet their annual contribution of 60 turkeys for the Blasdell Food Pantry.

Another change this year was that only cash donations were accepted. About \$50 was needed to feed each family on the list. The Frontier School Community was very generous as they donated the funds needed to feed local families during the Thanksgiving holiday.

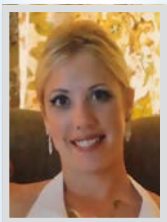

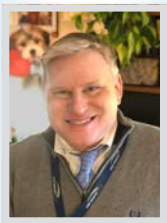

Message from the Superintendent

Hello Frontier Families:

As I write this message, I am very encouraged by how the 2021-22 school year has begun. Prior to the first day, I felt the same trepidation that many of you did when the time came to make the decision to re-open our doors for the benefit of all. As I review the first seven weeks of school, many of those concerns have been addressed and handled appropriately. Frontier Central School District maintains a healthy respect for the potential volatility of the COVID-19 virus, but we also fully understand the importance of educating our children in-person on a daily basis.

All of our students from grades PK-12 have been respectful, responsible and courteous to the rules in place regarding social distancing and mask wearing. The staff at FCSD understands that our protocols will be challenged and adjusted as we learn how to function within our new norm. I look forward to the remainder of the year and maintaining our high quality of education for our students.

A few highlights within our first couple of weeks:

- **Athletics:** Congratulations to all of our athletic teams who competed in the Section VI finals. Our Girls Varsity Volleyball team has won back-to-back Section VI titles. Boys Varsity Volleyball and Varsity Football put in great effort at the sectional championships and our Girls Varsity Gymnastics earned Section VI runner up. We are looking forward to the winter sports season!
- **Capital Project Update:** Over the summer voters approved a \$ 70 million capital project which targets improvements to all of our buildings. The work is going to be accomplished in phases 1a through phase 4 with completion in 2027-28.
- **Emergency Closures:** For the 2021-22 school calendar, the District has built in five available weather emergencies days. In the event of a school closure due to weather conditions, the District will be closed for students as per typical "snow days" of the past. In the event of a closure for reasons other than snow or road conditions (I.E. cold days/ wind days/building mechanical) the District will shift into a student remote day for instruction. Families will be notified in advance of these days in order for students and their teachers to be prepared for remote instruction.

In closing, I would be remiss not to thank each and every person in the District for working through our difficulties with transportation. As you are well aware, this is not a unique situation to Frontier, however that does not relieve the stress it places on all of our families. Our transportation staff has worked tirelessly to provide the services as expected under tremendous stress of understaffing due to driver shortages. Mid-way through November we are on the verge of hiring nine new drivers and adding routes. In addition, we upgraded our Versatrans My Stop App tracking system to assist families. Thank you for your patience and willingness to work with us.

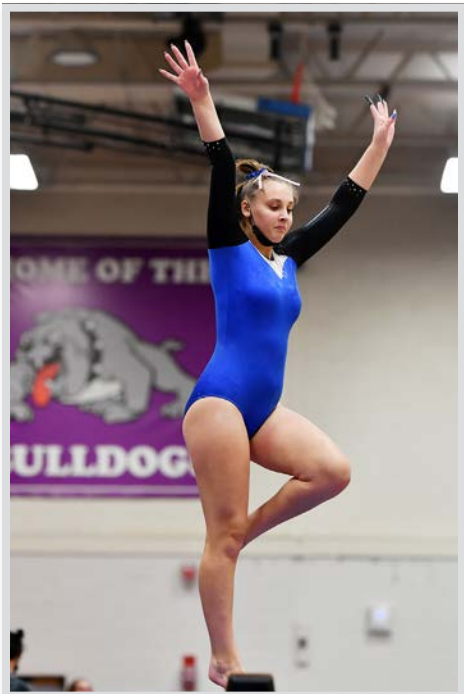
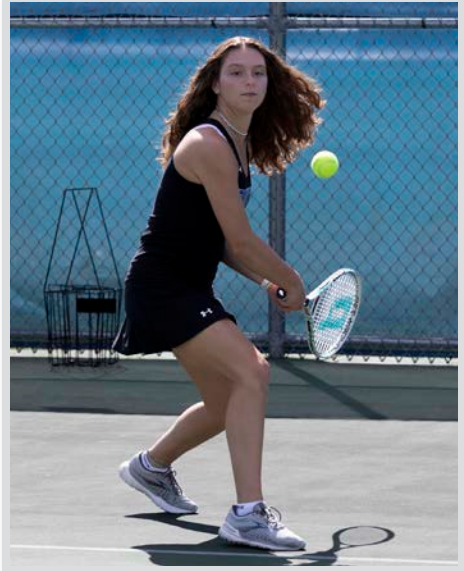
Falcon Community Update

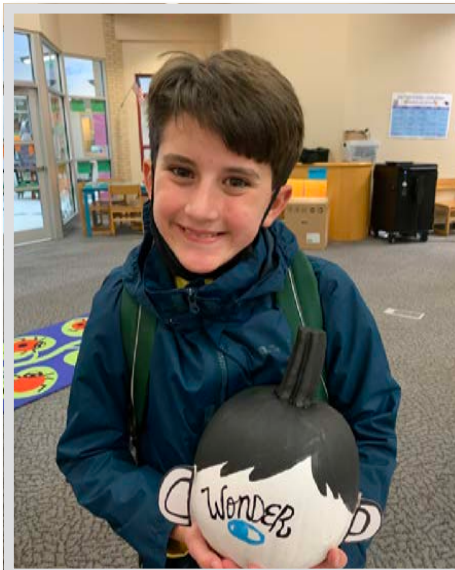

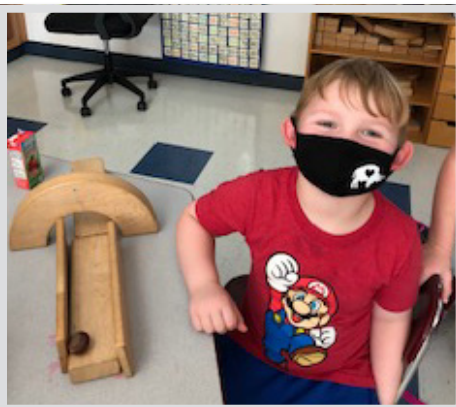

Big Tree Students Succeed with Flexible Seating

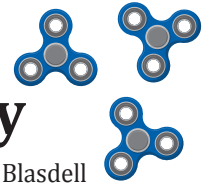

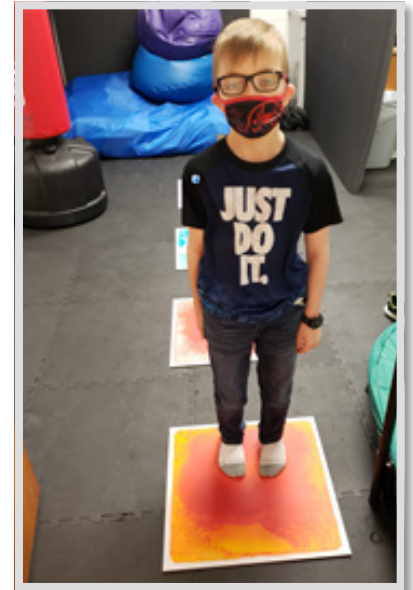

The Blasdell Sensory Room is giving our students the tools they need to focus and be ready to learn throughout the school day!

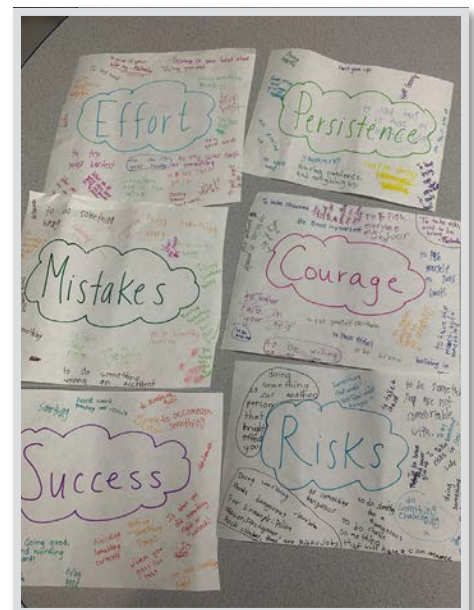
Cloverbank Students Learn About Growth Mindset

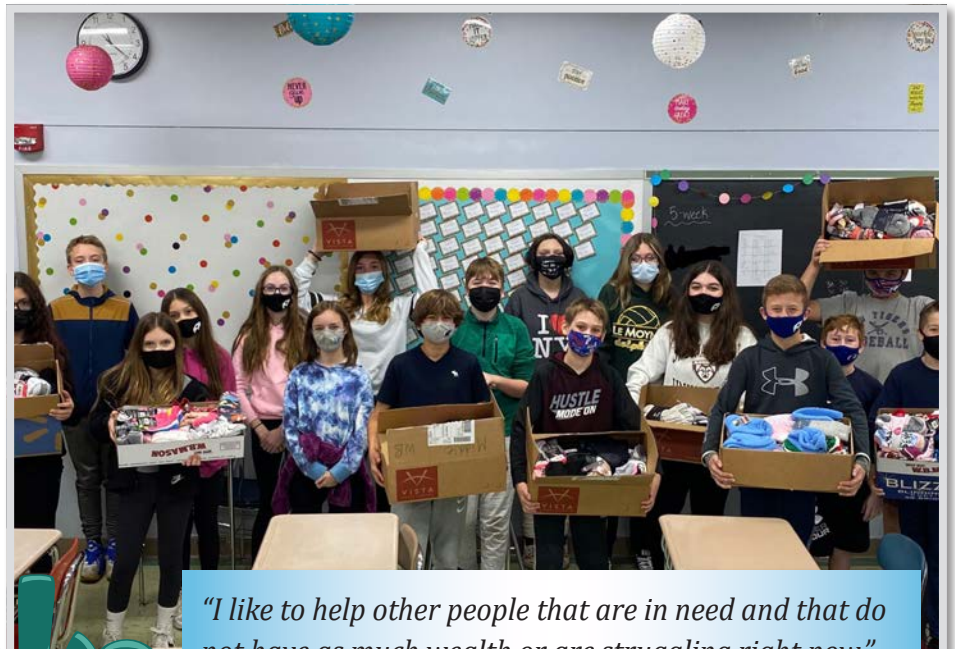
In the Pinehurst Library, Mrs. Calanni, provides students with activities like
